FROM the PRESIDENT

Dear Alumni,

On behalf of the most amazing artistic community in South Carolina, I bring you greetings from the Governor's School for the Arts and Humanities. I trust that the start of your fall semester has been as productive as ours has been on the campus.

The last academic year was truly outstanding for the Govie community, as we were finally able to realize the potential for many new experiences that we've initiated in recent years. Our work yielded moments of great accomplishment for the students and set the tone for our next phase of artistic and academic growth across the campus. In addition to a second successful offering of our film unit, production highlights of the spring semester included the first ever full-scale musical, Into the Woods, presented on the Governor's School campus. As a result of this great success, we have identified musical theater as the most promising option for a second, collaborative, interdisciplinary area of study, as film and screenwriting have now become part of our permanent offerings for students.

The opening of the fall semester also marked the finale of a milestone year for the Office of Outreach. Coupled with our ongoing efforts in reaching all 46 counties throughout the state, the successful first-year implementation of our Arts Grow SC - Spark grant resulted in record-setting numbers and deep, meaningful engagement opportunities across South Carolina. Throughout the year, we implemented 1,035 experiences, reaching 35 counties, 85,425 students, and 97,206 individuals overall. Adding to that exceptional record, our service-learning students completed close to 600 community service hours through the Connecting Arts Through Service Club (C.A.T.S.). I'd like to thank all Govie alumni who are active in the arts and in education, as your ongoing work has been critical to the success of many current students and future Govies, as well as our recent graduates. Over 30 alumni worked in various capacities over the course of the previous academic year, and we thank you for joining us in delivering a true-to-form Governor's School experience.

Our performance season is in full swing, and we would love to see you at an event on the campus or throughout the state. As always, I thank you for your continued support of the Governor's School and look forward to your participation in our alumni events in the very near future.

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SUMMER PROGRAMS

We welcomed an amazing 486 students to campus to participate in our 2022 summer programs! Students from 35 of the 46 counties in South Carolina were accepted into programs with a challenging and exciting curriculum. Daily schedules were designed with instruction time throughout the morning and afternoons. Arts presentations, off campus outings, and relaxed residential life activities were offered in the evenings.



The Academy Program consisted of 118 participants and was designed with instruction times throughout the morning and afternoon. The curriculum incorporated studio work, self-directed studies, performance, field trips, lectures and presentations by faculty and guest artists.

The two one-week Arts Odyssey program sessions welcomed in 310 students this summer! While attendees focused in one art area, they also had the opportunity to experience the other art areas through guest lectures, activities, and performances.

This year's summer dance program consisted of a five week session for rising 7th to 12th grade students. 26 participants were involved in Monday through Saturday classes designed especially for their age group. Their curriculum included ballet and pointe techniques, jazz, yoga, injury prevention/dance wellness, and African dance/cultural enrichment classes.

We were very excited to launch a new summer program this year! The two two-week Dance Immersion programs allowed beginning dancers to explore the world of dance in a fun and supportive environment. This program is intended for students who are passionate about dance, but may not have formal ballet training. This summer's 14 participants were able to explore a variety of classes, such as: Ballet, Modern/Contemporary, Jazz, Hip Hop, Acting for Dancers, African Dance, Yoga and Pilates.



We started the summer with our latest Teacher Retreat, Plug-In With Media Arts, where participants were introduced to music production, video production, and graphic design, focusing on free tools that could be integrated into both arts and non-arts classrooms. Our summer Spark team led drama-based literacy camps in Richland, Florence, and Williamsburg counties.
